

# Background

**SafeTO** is a **comprehensive plan** that requires a fundamental shift in thinking and acting to achieve transformative change.

**SafeTO** provides a **roadmap** for how the City and social systems that serve Torontonians, such as community services, healthcare systems, education systems, justice systems, police and business, can **work collaboratively across different sectors and across governments** to support community safety and wellbeing.

SafeTO will drive 26 priority actions across seven strategic goals over the next 10 years and is being led by the City's Social Development Finance and Administration Division.

At its November 6, 2021 meeting, **Toronto Police Services Board endorsed, adopted** and committed to continued engagement and involvement in the implementation of SafeTO.

<sup>\*</sup> A firearm discharge is defined as any incident where a witness/complainant reports the sound of guns shots, and evidence has been found to substantiate that a firearm discharge has occurred(eg. Spent casings, bullet holes, etc). A shooting is defined as an incident where a victim has sustained a gun shot wound.



#### **Executive Leadership Table**

- Mobilizes institutional resources and partnerships
- Triages barriers and challenges related to community violence and takes immediate action on staff recommendations
- Supports systemic and long-term solutions between institutional partners to address critical gaps.

- Build local capacity by working with local safety networks, community groups and resident leaders to amplify their efforts to reduce gun violence
- To debrief and assess potential risks and challenges presented; to support development and action collaborative strategies to mitigate risk and impact of violence.

# **Integrated Safety Coordination Teams (ISCT)**

- Membership of ISCT team includes multi sector partners that work to enhance collaboration across 6 zones to mobilize real-time safety challenges and plan prevention strategies.
- Toronto Police Service deploys local divisional Detective Sergeants, utilizes Neighbourhood Community Officers and leverages relevant support units including the Community Partnerships and Engagement Unit (CPEU), Centralized Shooting Response Teams (CSRT), Public Safety Response Teams (PSRT) and the Toronto Police Operations Centre (TPOC) as required to support the teams.
- A robust weekend coverage facilitates effective real time communication.
- A tracking tool has been developed to track ISCT conversations.
- ISCT's supported over 62 meetings/events/initiatives from July 2022 May 17, 2023 and collectively responded to all gun violence incidents including school-based incidents.

**66.6%** of Shootings and Firearm Discharges occurred **outside** of Priority Zones, compared to 2022.



Most Priority Zones have experienced **decreases** in Shootings and Firearm Discharges in 2023.
